Located at the end of a cedar tree lined lane off Crooked Oak Road is a second quarter of the nineteenth-century dwelling that defines the property historically known as "Friend's Choice." The two-story, center hall frame house, estimated to date around 1830-40, was built by Purnell Johnson (1816-1866), whose ancestors had occupied the same land since the early 1720s. Identified in the 1860 United States Census for Somerset County as a forty-five year old farmer, Purnell Johnson is listed with his 20-year old wife Sarah. Purnell Johnson's estate was valued at \$10,000.

The house Purnell and Sarah Johnson occupied was designed after a traditional center hall, single-pile plan, and it was trimmed with a moderate level of well-executed Federal/Greek Revival woodwork. The mantel in the north parlor is a particularly unusual interpretation of Federal design with its diamond-shaped lozenges that distinguish the moldings that flank the firebox.

Following Purnell Johnson's death in 1866, the Friend's Choice property was occupied by his widow Sarah, son Allison, and two minor children Marietta and Margaret. In 1888 Allison Johnson acquired 258 acres of the family farm, residing there until his death around 1928. The property passed to his three daughters, Alice Johnson Hubert, Margaret E. Johnson, and Sarah Johnson Blaine. Margaret E. Johnson resided on the farm until 1981, after which the property was sold out of the family.

The farm known as "Friend's Choice" is located on the west side of Crooked Oak Lane and on the north side of Pemberton Drive west of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-story, five-bay frame house, located at the end of a cedar tree lined lane, faces east with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built in two principal stages, the front two-story, center hall house dates to the second quarter of the nineteenth century, probably around 1830-40. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story rear wing erected around 1880-90. Supported on a low brick foundation, the exterior is clad with aluminum siding and the medium pitched gable roofs are covered with asphalt shingles.

The east (main) elevation is an asymmetrical five-bay facade with a center double leaf door entrance. The front doorway is topped by a two-light transom. The double leaf doors are original and date to the second quarter of the nineteenth century. Flanking the front door are two-over-two sash windows. The first floor is sheltered by a turned post porch which wraps around the house to the south side. The second floor is lighted by a series of unevenly spaced two-over-two sash windows. Finishing the base of the roof is a boxed cornice.

The north gable end is dominated by an exterior brick chimney laid in seven-course common bond. The chimney has a corbelled base and corbelled shoulders. Four-pane windows light the attic. The gable end is finished with an extended eave and short returns at the base of the roof.

The south gable end of the main block is sheltered on the first floor by the turned column front porch. A side entrance to the right of a rebuilt chimney stack is filled with an eight-panel mid nineteenth-century door. The chimney was rebuilt during the second quarter of the twentieth century with hard-fired brick.

The west (rear) wall of the main block is largely covered by the two story, two-room plan service wing. Single flue brick stove chimneys pierce the roofline.

The first floor interior is fitted with Federal/Greek Revival woodwork. A Federal stair rises against the south wall of the hall. A square profile newel post and slender rectangular balusters support a circular profile handrail. The perimeter of the hall is trimmed with a second quarter of the nineteenth-century chair rail and a beaded baseboard. Six-panel doors framed by Greek Revival corner block surrounds provide access to the rooms on each side of the hall. The surround molding is distinguished by a recessed series of descending ridges from a high point on the backband to a low groove in the center. The corner blocks are plain.

The north and south parlors are fitted with Federal/Greek Revival woodwork and the mantels, chair rail, and baseboards remain intact. The mantel in the north parlor is particularly unusual with an unconventional diamond design that distinguishes each side. The frieze is divided into a five-part composition, and the shelf is composed of a series of early to mid nineteenth-century moldings.

This frame house is five bays wide, 2½ stories high, with a rear ell. The house is covered with siding, and the roof with modern asphalt shingle. An exterior chimney appears in either gable end. Flanking the central entrance are four two-over-two light windows, and there are five slightly smaller two-over-two windows across the second floor. On the left end of the building, a door is to the right of the chimney, and two windows flank the chimney on the second floor. A small four light window appears beside the chimney in the attic. The roof has return cornices. The house has a wrap-around porch with balusters and turned posts.




