St. Philips Episcopal Church, located in the town of Quantico, is a well preserved cruciform frame church that contributes significantly to the town's historic district. The single-story weatherboard church is distinguished by an entrance and bell tower that rises in the northwest corner of the cross plan. Covering the gable ends as well as the top of the tower are fishscale shingles. Estimated to date to around 1900, the church combines architectural elements that are linked to both the Victorian period as well as the Colonial Revival. The combination of different types of siding along with the off-axis entrance and bell tower point to late nineteenth century church design common to the lower Shore, while the small multi-pane first floor windows and the Palladian style second floor windows point to the influence of the Colonial Revival. Joining the church on the lot is a single-story parish hall erected in 1931. Built into the side of a south facing slope, the shingled frame parish hall displays clear references to the bungalow style. The tapered front porch posts and the exposed rafter ends are two features sometimes associated with bungalow dwellings.

St. Philips Episcopal Church is located on the southeast side of Main Street in the town of Quantico, Wicomico County, Maryland. The single-story cruciform frame church faces northwest. Joining the church on the large lot is a single-story frame parish house and a nineteenth and twentieth century cemetery.

Built around 1900, the single-story cross-shaped frame church rests on a stretcher bond brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with a combination of plain weatherboard siding and fishscale shingles. The decorative shingles are limited to the area within the gable end of each elevation. The steeply pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

The northwest (main) elevation is marked by a gable-front facade pierced by squarish multi-pane colored glass windows on the first floor, and a tripartite Palladian-style colored glass window fills the gable end. The eaves to the roof extend over the side walls of the church, and the rafter ends are exposed and finished with beaded edges. Piercing the brick foundation are small cross-shaped vents. Rising on the northwest corner of the cross plan is an entrance and bell tower. Five-panel double doors topped by a colored glass transom marks the first floor. Above the first floor the tower tapers in a line that follows a bell curve to the belfry. The upper portion of the tower is covered with fishscale shingles. Marking each side of the belfry is a round arched opening. The pyramidal roof of the tower has flared eaves.

The gable end on the north side of the church is detailed in a similar manner as the front wall with multi-pane colored glass windows on the first floor and a tripartite window set within the gable end. The south leg of the cross plan is finished in the same way.

Attached to the back of the church is the east leg of the cruciform plan, the sacristy, and low shed roofed sections extend from the side walls of the sacristy. A single flue stove chimney extends through the eave on the south side of the sacristy.

The interior of the church was not seen.

Standing southeast of the church is a single-story frame parish hall built into the side of a south facing slope. Erected in 1931, the three-bay by six-bay frame structure is supported by nine-course common bond brick foundation which is fully exposed on the south side. A series of barred six-over-six sash windows pierce the south wall. The walls of the parish house are covered with wood shingles, and the roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles. The northeast (main) elevation is a symmetrical facade with a center entrance and flanking twelve-over-twelve sash windows. The front door is sheltered by a single bay porch supported by square tapered columns. The rafter ends to the parish house are exposed. Attached to the back of the main parish house is a low single story wing.


ST. PHILLIPS EPISCOPAL CHAPEL

It resembles the chapel in Vienna, though plainer in detail.


