St. Mary's Episcopal Church is oldest frame religious structures located in western Wicomico County. Built in 1845 on the site of the original late eighteenth century chapel, St. Mary's is a single-story, gable-front frame structure lighted by nine-over-six sash windows. The weatherboard frame church has survived with many of its original interior features including stout square support posts with chamfered corners and lamb's tongue stops. The posts support large beaded edge tie beams that connect the sides of the church. A semi-circular board ceiling survives and contrasts with the narrow tongue-and-groove boards that sheath the walls. A gallery stretches across the south end of the sanctuary.

The organization of a separate Episcopal congregation independent of Green Hill and St. Paul's dates to the last decades of the eighteenth century. A frame chapel stood on this site by 1796-98 and soon became a local landmark and point of reference for area descriptions. The chapel is referred to in several entries in the Federal Direct tax assessment levied in 1798. The late eighteenth century chapel burned in 1834, and it was not replaced by the current building until eleven years later.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

St. Mary's Episcopal Church stands on the north side of Nanticoke Road (MD 349) between Cox's Corner and Bivalve in Wicomico County, Maryland. The single-story gable roofed frame church faces south with the roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built in 1845, the single-story frame church is supported on a low brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with vinyl siding. The steeply pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The eaves are slightly extended with short returns at the base of the roof.

The south (main) elevation is a three-bay facade with a center entrance and flanking nine-over-six sash windows. The window openings are flanked by vinyl shutters. The double front doors have shallow raised panels and are topped by a four-light transom. Piercing the upper gable end to light the balcony are two six-over-six sash windows.

The east and west sides are three bays across with six-over-six sash windows flanked by vinyl shutters. Finishing the base of the roof is a boxed cornice. A single flue brick stove stack rises through each side wall.

The north (rear) wall is defined by two nine-over-six sash windows on the first floor and a pair of six-over-six sash windows in the gable end. The edge to the roof is flush.

The interior has survived with a large portion of its second quarter of the nineteenth century finishes. Large square posts with chamfered corners and lamb's tongue stops rise in the middle of the building to support beaded edge tie beams. A balcony stretches across the south end. The walls are covered with vertical, tongue-and-groove beaded boards, and there is a vaulted board ceiling.

Surrounding the church on two sides is a nineteenth and twentieth century cemetery.

The building is eligible for listing in Category A, which identifies buildings that must be preserved for architectural and/or historical significance. St. Mary’s Episcopal Church would also qualify for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.


