The Dr. John S. Aydelotte house is an important early nineteenth-century dwelling that stands along East Market Street in the heart of Snow Hill. The two-and-a-half story frame house was built around 1835 for Levin Townsend, a prominent land owner who also had business interests in Snow Hill. Levin Townsend married Elizabeth Porter on October 23, 1839, and the couple is listed in the 1850 U. S. Census for Worcester County. Their daughter, Priscilla, married George M. Upshur, and the Upshurs evidently occupied the town residence during the mid nineteenth century. In 1860 Levin Townsend died, and his will directed that the Market Street house should be awarded to his grandson, James W. Upshur, then eighteen years old. Nine years later, in May 1869, James W. Upshur sold his grandparent's property, identified as "Lot 26," to William James Aydelotte. Evidently, during the next decade William Aydelotte financed a remodeling of the frame house in Victorian taste with the rebuilding of the roof. Cross gables were centered on the main house as well as the east end wing, and patterned slate was used to cover the structure. Dr. John S. Aydelotte occupied the house during the 1870s for he is located on the 1877 Snow Hill town map. John S. Aydelotote, however, did not gain title to the property until his father's death in 1897. During the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries Dr. Aydelotte was one of the most prominent physcians in Snow Hill.

The most significant architectural features of the house include the sidelighted front entance with unusual Ionic columns highlighting the

doorway in addition to the original woodwork inside. Distinctive to this house are the acorn shaped finials in the east end wing and on the second floor.

It appears from a chain of title for this lot that Levin Townsend acquired "Lot 26" in a purchase of land from Worcester County sheriff, James Powell, in March 1827. James Powell was empowered to sell the lands involved in the bankruptcy settlement of the Farmers Bank of Somerset and Worcester. The bank had acquired "Lot 26" as well as part of "Lot 24" in May 1814, and the institution presumably operated in Snow Hill between 1814 and its financial failure in 1827. The location or appearance of the bank building is uncertain. Late in November 1834, fire destroyed the center portion of Snow Hill including Levin Townsend's house, presumably standing on "Lot 26" at the time. From the architectural details of the house he built the extant structure shortly afterwards. In more recent years the house has been converted to a bed and breakfast inn.

The Dr. John S. Aydelotte house stands at 104 East Market Street in the center of Snow Hill, Worcester County, Maryland. The two-story-and-a-half story five-bay house faces northwest with the principal gable oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

Built around 1825, the two-story-and-a-half story main block is supported by a common bond brick foundation with an excavated cellar. The house has been uniformly sheathed with vinyl siding, and it is covered by a steeply pitched patterned slate roof. Attached to the northeast gable end of the main house is a contemporary story-and-a-half frame wing. Extending to the rear are later nineteenth- and twentieth-century additions. Within the past few years the house has been converted to a bed-and-breakfast inn. Stretching across the front of the property is a decorative iron fence that retains Dr. Aydelotte's name plate.

The north (main) elevation of the front block is a symmetrical five-bay facade with a center sidelighted entrance. The replacement six-panel front door is framed by a half-round fluted columns to each side of the diamond shaped muntin sidelights. Each diamond shaped muntin is enhanced by a delicate ellipse that is incorporated within the diamond. Fixed atop the columns to each side of the seven-light transom are unusual blocks fitted with Ionic capitals. To each side of the entrance are pairs of two-over-two sash windows that are hung with louvered shutters. The second floor is pierced by five evenly spaced six-over-six sash windows that are also framed by louvered shutters, and a closed shutter Gothic arch opening marks the center cross gable. Piercing the foundation wall of the main house are four window openings that are protected by diamond cross-sectioned horizontal bars.

The southwest gable end of the main house is lighted by nine-over-six sash windows on the first floor, whereas six-over-six sash windows illuminate the second floor. Smaller sized six-over-six sash windows pierce the uppermost gable end to each side of the interior end brick chimney. The eaves are extended beyond the wall surface, and are finished at the base with returns.

The northeast gable end of the main block is covered largely by a story-and-a-half frame wing that is contemporary with the main block. The frame wing is a three-bay by one-room structure that follows similar details found with the main block. A partially glazed front door marks the western bay, while a pair of two-over-two sash windows illuminate the first floor. A cross-gable, centered on the slate roof, is pierced by a pointed arch sash window. A pair of cellar grills define the wing foundation as well. Rising against the north end is a five-course common bond brick stack with a corbelled shoulder and base. An adjacent bulkhead entrance provides access to the cellar, and six-over-six sash windows light the second floor. The back of the wing is partially covered by later additions, but an early gabled dormer remains lighting the loft.

The Dr. John S. Aydelotte house is an important early nineteenth-century dwelling that stands along East Market Street in the center of Snow Hill, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story frame house was built clearly around 1825 with its late federal style stairs, mantels, and nine-over-six sash windows. During the second half of the nineteenth century the house was owned by Dr. John S. Aydelotte, a prominent Snow Hill physician, who financed a reworking of the exterior in Victorian taste about the time of the Civil War. Included in the renovation was the reshaping of the roofs with extended eaves and center cross gables as well as layers of patterned slate. Gothic arched windows were added to cross gables and long two-over-two sash windows across the first floor front were introduced to strengthen the change in appearance. Dr. Aydelotte erected also a metal fence, and the gate still carries his name plate. Dr. Aydelotte's house, now the Snow Hill Inn, is a significant representation of a major early nineteenth-century dwelling that was reworked forty years after initial construction to fit alternative Victorian designs. Aside from a dining room addition across the back of the house the building has not changed significantly since the Civil War.

Dr. John S. Aydelotte house description (continued)

The interior is traditionally divided with a center stair hall and a room to each side. The north wing follows a side hall/parlor plan. In the wing the room was probably used as an office or bedroom rather than a parlor. The center hall contains a federal style stair with a turned newel post, slender turned balusters, and a slight oval-profile handrail. The step-ends are trimmed with a decorative scroll, and the area below the stringer is plastered. A small six-panel door provides access to the cellar stair. The four-panel doors that open into the adjacent rooms are framed by fluted surrounds with bulls-eye corner blocks. The hall is fitted with a stepped baseboard molding as well.

South of the hall is the parlor which is trimmed with similar moldings around the doors and windows. The fluted window surrounds reach the floor, however the window apron is plastered. Fixed to the chimney breast is a late federal style mantel with fluted pilasters and a raised panel frieze. The frieze blocks above each pilaster are decorated with a fluted oval lozenge set within a clipped corner panel. The mantel shelf rests atop a series of graduated stepped bed moldings.

The dining room north of the hall is similarly treated with late federal style finishes. The federal mantel is complemented by early nineteenth-century chair rail and a stepped baseboard molding. A four-panel door in the rear corner opens into the center hall, and another paneled door opens into the kitchen. Old nine-over-six sash windows in both the parlor remain along the rear wall.

Next to the dining room is the northend wing with a side stair hall and second stair. The open-string stair rises in two flights with slender turned newel posts topped with acorn shaped finials. Two rectangular balusters to each stread support a molded handrail. Each landing post is finished with the same acorn finial. The step ends are trimmed with a scrolled decoration. A raised six-panel door with a iron box lock and deadbolt opens into a closet beneath the stair. The hall is also trimmed with a plain early nineteenth-century chair rail and baseboard. The room immediately adjacent is finished with contemporary woodwork. The federal style mantel is defined by semi-detached columns, projecting frieze blocks with inset panels, and stepped mantel shelf. The four-panel doors are framed by fluted surrounds with plain corner blocks, and chair rail and baseboard trim the perimeter of the room. A bathroom has been added to the back of the room.

The second floor of the main house is divided in the same way with a center hall and flanking rooms. Fixed in the north corner of the hall is the attic stair that carries the same newel and acorn finial as the north wing stair. The stringer is scrolled in the same way as well. A two-panel door opens into the stair closet.

The adjacent bedrooms are simply finished. Fixed to the chimney breast in the southwest bedroom is a straightforward late federal mantel with fluted pilasters, a plain frieze, and a board shelf. A modern bathroom and closets have been added along the rear wall. The northwest bedroom includes a small fireplace and a double door nineteenth-century closet.

Double six-panel doors are framed by bulls-eye block surrounds. South of the northwest bedroom is a narrow hall that leads to the north wing. A pair of modern bathrooms have been installed on the south side of the passage.

The north wing is fitted with early nineteenth-century features included four-panel or two-panel doors that open into closets or the two bedrooms. Clearly visible in the north bedroom is a shift in the flooring from the wide pine of the original room and the narrow boards laid down when the cross gable replaced the older style dormer.




FIRST FLOOR





5. Description of physical appearance:

The building consists of 3 main parts:

1. Late 18th century 1½ story cabin.
2. Subsequent rear addition.
3. Middle 19th century 2½ story large frame addition.
4. Rear porch addition - 1970's scavenged materials.

The building is listed in the Historic Sites Inventory - Volume 2 - listing WRCS-105 on page 65 as "House, 104 East Market Street." In its present form, the house possesses many window door and trim types post and beam details, hand hewn rafters beams and stairrails. Some of the heart - pine floor boards are 18" wide. All interior moldings and fireplaces are original. Originally the building was a simple Georgian design and was altered with enlarged 2/2 first story windows, dormers with gothic arches and fancy slate roof.



6. Statement of significance: For a period of nearly fifty years, since the original Snow Hill Inn was burned the 300 year old County Seat of Worcester had no guest accomodation. In 1985, however the Adeloyttee House on 104 E. Market Street began a new life as the Snow Hill Inn with 7 guest rooms, modeled on the European bed and breakfast. During the recent drought years, the town has encouraged tourism to augment the agriculturally based economy. The owners made another extraordinary step to start tourism in Snow Hill by constructing a 70 seat full service resturant. The house in its past life was significant architecturally and historically to the county seat of Snow Hill. Dr. John S. Aydelotte, whose name is on the cast iron gate, owned the property in the late 19th century. The worn stair riser knicked by his rocking chair in the front hall is still marked. At one time the rear addition served as the Snow Hill Post Office. The basement interior doors are late 18th century with large strap hinges and wooden encased locks. The "kitchen" basement of the first section still has the trammel in the fireplace. There is also a secret passage with underground vault. Folklore has it that a child impaled himself on the spears of the front fence only to be aided by the good Dr. Aydelotte.












