The Zion United Methodist church, sometimes referred to in older records as the St. Martin's Neck Methodist Episcopal church, was erected in 1908 under the leadership of Reverend Emory McDowell. The St. Martin's Neck Methodist congregation, however, is much older. A congregation is known to have organized as early as the late 1770s. Recorded in Bishop Francis Asbury's journal are references to having preached at "St. Martin's southeast of Bishopville." Dedication an early church building occurred in April of 1810.

This early twentieth-century church is similar to others from the same period with its conservative use of Gothic Revival style features. The pointed arch lancet windows and the three-story pyramidal roofed spire are the most dominant features. Standing east of the church is the old School No. 3, now used as a community hall for the church.

The Zion United Methodist church is located on the north side of Back Creek Road east of Bishopville, Worcester County, Maryland. The single-story frame church faces south with the gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Built in 1908, the aluminum clad weatherboard frame church is supported by a minimal, continuous brick foundation and is covered by a steeply pitched asphalt shingle roof. Dominating the south elevation is a three-story entrance and bell tower. Attached to the east side of the church is a shorter single-story Sunday school addition erected in 1967.

The south (main) elevation is a symmetrical three-bay elevation with a centered projecting bell tower. The entrance has been reworked, but retains a triangular shaped colored glass transom. The second floor of the tower is lighted by a diamond-shaped colored glass window, while the third floor is marked by louvered openings on each side. The short pyramidal spire is interrupted by small gable roofs above each louvered opening, and the peak is topped by a small cross. Flanking the tower are single colored glass lancet windows. Fixed in the front corner of the foundation is a marble datestone inscribed "Zion M. E. Church, Built 1881, Rebuilt, 1908"

The west side of the church is pierced by four colored glass lancet windows, while the east side is partially covered by the single story Sunday school room addition. When the Sunday school room was added the colored glass windows removed from the east wall were reused in the south wall of the addition.

To the north (rear) side of the church a single-story shed roofed addition has been added which partially covers the three sided apse. Rising through the roof is a narrow brick stove stack.

The interior has been reworked with resheathed walls and a remodeled altar. Inside the main entrance a double-door is topped by a double-pane transom. Framing the colored glass windows is Victorian molded trim. The Victorian pews feature Gothic shaped panels in each end. More modern altar furniture is featured on the raised pulpit.

Behind the church is a nineteenth- and twentieth century cemetery.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

Zion United Methodist church was erected in 1908 on the site of an older structure built in 1881, however a Methodist congregation is reported to have been meeting in the area since the late eighteenth century. The early twentieth century church features simple references to the Gothic Revival style with pointed arch, colored glass lancet windows. Dominating the front of the single story structure is a three-story entrance and bell tower capped by a pyramidal roofed spire. Along with an exterior cladding of aluminum the interior has been remodeled with resheathed walls and a restyled altar. Victorian pews with Gothic arched end panels and molded trim that frames colored glass windows comprise the most significant interior period features. The old School No. 3 standing next to the church has been converted to a community hall. (See WO-240)


