Located at the north end of Bishopville is the Levin W. Collins house, a two-and-a-half story, center hall frame dwelling that is decorated with a center cross gable, a bracketed eave, and a turned post front porch. Dating to around the time of the Civil War, the front section is actually an addition to an earlier story-and-a-half one-room plan frame house that is covered with wooden shingles and finished inside with late Federal style woodwork. The small farm is designated on the 1877 atlas under the ownership of Levin W. Collins, and the property remains in family hands.

The Levin W. Collins house stands on the east side of Main Street in the small village of Bishopville, Worcester County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, center hall frame house faces west with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built in two principal stages, the story-and-a-half one room plan rear wing predates Civil War era front section by several decades. The entire house is supported by a minimal brick foundation, and the house is sheathed by a combination of wood shingles and plain weatherboards. The wood shingles are confined to the early story-and-a-half rear wing. A layer of asphalt shingles covers the medium pitched gabled roofs.

The west (main) facade is a symmetrical five-bay elevation with a center boldly molded door that is framed by two-pane sidelights and three-light transom. Flanking the entrance are pairs of two-over-two sash windows, some retaining louvered shutters. A hip roof front porch shelters the center three bays, and it is supported by turned porch posts with delicate spindle brackets. Marking the center bay is a cross gable with decorative sawnwork in the eave. The front of the gable is covered with fishscale shingles. A turned baluster handrail stretches between the porch posts. The second floor is marked by a three-part window in the center bay, and pairs of two-over-two sash windows fill the outer openings. A centered cross gable interrupts the roofline and a field of fishscale shingles surround a pointed arch attic window. Trimming the cornice is a row of Victorian brackets, and the corners of the house are trimmed with paneled pilasters.

The north and south gable ends are similar with interior end brick stacks flanked by two-over-two sash windows. The corners of the house are trimmed with paneled pilasters, and the eaves are bracketed.

The east side of the main house is partially covered by the story-and-a-half frame service wing part of which dates to the 1840s. The one room plan frame wing is covered on two sides with a partially enclosed square post porch and a rear shed kitchen added during the 1920s. The north side of the 1840s section is three bays across with a center four-panel door and flanking six-over-six sash windows. Small gabled dormers with two-over-two sash windows light the loft. Protruding through the roof is an interior end brick stack with flanking four-pane attic windows. The gable end is flush.

The interior of the front section has not changed significantly since the late nineteenth century. A center stair features a heavily turned newel post with a series of turned balusters that support a molded handrail. Four-panel doors framed by molded surrounds open into the adjacent rooms which feature Victorian mantels and plaster walls.



The Levin W. Collins house is a distinctive two-and-a-half story bracketed center hall frame house that stands on Main Street in the small village of Bishopville. Built around the time of the Civil War, the weatherboarded front section was actually an addition to an 1840s one room plan dwelling that now serves as part of the rear service wing. The ell-shaped house survives with much of its exterior and interior features, and the many of the finish surfaces retain late nineteenth-century layers of decorative graining. Noteworthy features for the 1840s house include the shingled exterior and the late Federal style woodwork.

The second floor features an unusual curved wall in the ell-shaped hall that separates the two bedrooms. An enclosed attic stair rises above the main stair. Much of the woodwork in the front of the house survives with its original grained paint decoration.

The back rooms is finished with late Federal style woodwork with paneled window and door surrounds that have plain corner blocks. Fixed to the east wall is a period mantel with a paneled frieze and pilasters along with a thick board mantel shelf. A tight winder stair rises in the southeast corner and is enclosed behind a four-panel door.


