The Messenger Building

Occupying an important West Market Street lot directly across the street from the Worcester County Courthouse is this three-story, four-bay brick building that currently holds the offices for the Maryland Department of Assessments. The Victorian brick facade stands in contrast to nearby buildings with its alternating yellow and red brick segmental arches and corbelled brick cornice. The first floor commercial front retains a bracketed eave and large glass display windows, but the fanciful sawn decoration that originally enriched the entrance bays has been removed.

For many years this expressive brick commercial building was known as the Messenger building since it housed the offices of the Democratic Messenger when the paper was written and printed in Snow Hill. Entries in the paper shortly after the August 1893 fire indicate this was one of the first buildings built in the so-called "burnt district." On September 9, 1893, the paper related that,

Work on the building to be occupied as the post office, Dr. Hall's Drug Store, and the Messenger office has been commenced, and we hope before cold weather to get into our part of it. It is on the same sight (sic) as was occupied by us before the fire and will be an imposing structure.

The construction of the Messenger building, supervised by contractor Edward Dixon, progressed through the fall months of 1893 and by late December plasters were inside spreading the initial layer. Obviously interested in the progress the Democratic Messenger announced on December 30 that,

The three-story building in front of the Court House being built by O. D. Collins, Esq. to be known as the Messenger Building has received the first coat of plaster, and the second story will be completed for us next week, so that after the Holidays, our friends will find us over the postoffice, as of old, and in the only three-story building in town. The Messenger Building is an imposing structure and reflects much credit on the owner who planned it without the aid of an architect. Everyone of its tenants should feel as the editors of this paper will, proud of their quarters in such a building.

In past times the building has served also as the meeting lodge for the Snow Hill chapter of Redmen.

The old Redmen's Lodge building, now housing the Maryland Department of Assessments, stands on the northeast corner of West Market and Pearl streets in the center of Snow Hill, Worcester County, Maryland. The three-story, four-bay rectangular brick building faces southeast.

Built around 1894, the five-course common bond brick building is topped by parapet walls that hide a flat roof. The southeast (main) elevation is a symmetrical four-bay facade with separate entrances that once permitted access to individual shops. Large glass display windows with paneled knee walls flank the front doors, and a bracketed wood cornice stretches above the display windows. The front of the building was formerly fitted with much more elaborate Victorian sawnwork that has been removed. The second and third floors are lighted by rows of four two-over-two sash windows, the window arches are highlighted by alternating dark and light colored brick. Continuing the alternating brick pattern is the decorative corbelled brick cornice.

The southwest facade borders Pearl Street and a side four-panel door topped by a two-pane transom. A second recessed door opens into the present tax assessors office. Rows of four two-over-two sash windows light the second and third floors.

The other two sides of the building are largely covered by adjacent commercial structures.

The interiors have been thoroughly reworked as modern offices for the Maryland Department of Assessments. The interior was gutted of most late nineteenth-century features.



Known to have been erected between the 1893 fire and the publication of the 1895 Sanborn Insurance map, the building once served as the former offices of the Democratic Messenger and the meeting place for the Snow Hill chapter of Redmen.





