The old Cherrix hardware store provides an interesting contrast in commercial buildings when reflecting on its immediate neighbors on Pearl Street. The Masonic Hall directly north is a large, three-story, five-bay brick building, one of the largest structures in the Snow Hill business district. Directly south is the old Commercial National Bank, a finely appointed single-story slate roofed building with colored glass windows and a corner tower. The old hardware store is a more common type of commercial building for the late nineteenth century with a two-story elevation, segmental arched windows, and a decorative metal cornice that finishes the top of the parapet wall. The interior of the old hardware store is notable for its surviving platform elevator that is marked, "Morse Elevator Works, New York and Philadelphia." Designated on the 1895 insurance map, the building housed general supplies.

The old Cherrix hardware store, currently known as the Fashion Shop, is a two-story, three-bay brick commercial building that is located on Pearl Street in the heart of the Snow Hill business district. The building faces northeast.

Built in 1894-1895, the two-story store is laid with a stretcher bond front wall and seven-course common bond side and rear walls. The flat roof is hidden by parapets.

The northeast (main) facade is a three-bay elevation with a reworked first floor storefront. The second floor remains unaltered to any great degree with three evenly spaced two-over-two sash windows topped by raised brick segmental arches. The second floor wall is set one brick in from the outer corners. Marking the space above the windows are three screened vents, and a row of corbelled bricks fill the recess in the wall surface. Finishing the top of the building is a decorated metal cornice with enriched bands of various moldings. Molded blocks terminate the cornice and each one is topped by a pointed finial.

The south side, common bond elevation is stepped toward the back of the building, and an interior side brick stove stack protrudes through the parapet. The back of the building is marked by a replacement center door and adjacent bricked-up windows. The second floor is lighted by three two-over-two sash windows, while the top of the wall is treated in corbelled brick.

The interior has been remodeled, but remaining in the rear southwest corner is the old platform elevator. The elevator is marked, "Morse Elevator Works, New York and Philadelphia." Fixed against the north wall is a period Victorian stair characterized by a large square newel post, a molded handrail, and a stick-style balustrade. At the head of the stair is a glazed door that opens into a large storage room. A modern office space has been added to the front of the second floor.
