The Edward J. Gilliss house stands out in the small rural crossroads of St. Martins as the oldest extant dwelling. The two-story, center hall frame dwelling, built just prior to the Civil War, is distinctive for its hip roof, bracketed eave, and mid nineteenth century woodwork. The house is extended to the rear by a story-and-a-half dining room and service wing.

The house is reported to have been built by William or Lemuel Showell, both prominent land owners in northern Worcester County during the second half of the nineteenth century. Starting out as a small agriculture oriented crossroads by the second quarter of the nineteenth century, St. Martins developed into a modest village by the 1860s with the construction of the Wicomico & Pocomoke railroad through the village in 1868. By the time the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas was published in 1877 the village comprised a half dozen dwellings, a Methodist Episcopal church, a school, a railroad depot along with some freight houses. The railroad bed cut across the south lawn adjacent to this house. Edward J. Gilliss bought this property during the 1880s, and the house and lot have remained in Gilliss family hands to the present day.

The Edward J. Gilliss house stands in the small rural crossroads village of St. Martins, Worcester County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay frame dwelling faces west with the hip roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1860, the two-story center hall frame dwelling is supported by a minimal brick foundation, and the weatherboard frame structure is sheathed with aluminum siding. The hip roof is covered with a layer of asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a story-and-a-half dining room and kitchen wing.

The west (main) facade is a symmetrical three-bay elevation iwth a center sidelighted entrance and flanking six-over-six sash windows. The heavily molded four-panel front door is framed by three-light sidelights and a two-light transom. The windows are framed by slightly arched window surrounds. Sheltering the front entrance is a hip roof porch with replacement metal porch posts. The historic photograph of the dwelling taken around 1910 shows turned posts with decorative corner brackets. The second floor is evenly marked by three six-over-six sash windows which are framed by the same slightly arched surrounds. Trimming the eave are widely spaced brackets, and the corners of the house are marked by covered over pilasters.

The ends of the house are pierced by six-over-six sash windows, and rising through each end are stuccoed brick chimneys. The east (rear) side of the main block is largely covered by the story-and-a-half dining room and service wing. According to family history the dormers lighting the second floor were added around 1880-1890.

The interior has retained much of its third quarter of the nineteenth century woodwork. The center hall contains the original stair with a heavily turned newel post, a decorated stringer, and a molded handrail. Four-panel doors open into the adjacent rooms which are fitted with period mantels and baseboard. The second floor is finished in a plain manner without exceptional features. The original kitchen contained a large cooking hearth which was removed by the present owners when the renovation the space during the past thirty years.

The Edward J. Gilliss house is probably the oldest structure remaining in the small crossroads village of St. Martins in northern Worcester County. The two-story center hall frame dwelling follows a traditional vernacular house form and it is trimmed conservatively with mid nineteenth century details including a bracketed eave and slightly pedimented window surrounds. The interior is finished with standard mid nineteenth century woodwork. The house has been modified during the past generation with the application of aluminum siding and replacement porch posts.
