The Alfred Pinchin house is not easily classified as belonging to a particular late nineteenth century architectural style. Various Victorian building features not especially rare in other houses, were combined in this design in an unconventional manner for an unusual result. The center hall/double-pile floor plan, the symmetrical elevation, and the two-story bay are common features for the period, however the combination of a pyramidal roof and rooftop cupola is more typical of public rather than domestic architecture. Despite the unconventional nature of the roof, the West Federal street house offers an interesting contrast to the neighboring mid to late nineteenth century dwellings.

During the 1880s, Alfred Pinchin purchased several parcels of land on the north side of Federal Street in a apparent plan to create a generous sized town property for his new house. In September 1882 he purchased the largest portion, "...all that vacant lot designated as Lot 3 in report of sales and lying between Lot 2 in said report and the lot of Ephraim Wilson front 108'10" Federal Street aforesaid and running back a depth of 284' to the meadow lot of Irving T. Matthews." It is presumed that Alfred Pinchin financed the construction of this house within the next year. He and his wife, Esther Gordon Handy, lived out their lives in Snow Hill. The couple are buried in the All Hallows Episcopal Church cemetery. After Alfred's death in 1894, Esther sold their house the following year to a committee of the Presbyterian Church which was searching for a manse. The Pinchin house served as the Presbyterian manse until 1950.

The Alfred Pinchin house, known also as the old Presbyterian Manse, stands at 302 West Federal Street in the western residential district of Snow Hill, Worcester County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, five-bay frame dwelling faces southeast.

Built c. 1882-1883, this two-and-a-half story center hall/double-pile frame house is supported on a low brick foundation, and the squarish house is sheathed with a layer of asbestos shingles. The pyramidal roof, covered with standing seam tin, is topped by a pyramidal roofed cupola.

The southeast (main) elevation is a symmetrical five-bay facade with a center double-door entrance topped by a multi-pane transom. Flanking the front door are unusual elongated sash windows that retain pairs of louvered shutters. The window lintels carry a slight header molding. Lighting the second floor are four evenly spaced two-over-two sash windows with the same header molding and louvered shutters. The base to the roof is finished with a boxed cornice. Highlighting the south slope of the roof is a hip roofed dormer filled with paired two-over-two sash windows. The rooftop cupola is finished on each side with louvered vents. Rising through the west side of the house is an internal brick stack topped by a corbelled cap.

The southwest side is defined by a five-bay first floor. A center side entrance is flanked by two-over-two sash windows. The door is sheltered by a gable roofed stoop that features a sawn baluster handrail.

The northeast facade, on the other hand, is marked by a two-story bay pavilion with a chimney rising against the east side of the house. A third chimney rises in the back of the house.

The interior was not seen.





