The Ephraim King Wilson house is an architecturally prominent two-and-a-half story cross-shaped dwelling built around 1860 by the Makemie Presbyterian Church as a parsonage. Unusual to most parsonages is the large size of this seven bay frame house. Although the cross shaped appearance of this dwelling is unusual, it is not without precedent in Snow Hill. Built about ten years earlier, the Walter P. Snow house is strikingly similar, although the room dispositions of the two houses vary.

On September 8, 1860, the heirs of Denard Williams, Theodore W. Williams and Rosa F. D. Williams sold part of the Williams estate marked "Division C" to a committee of the Presbyterian church. Seventeen years later, in 1877, the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas designates the corner lot, "Presby. Parsonage." In January 1882 the Presbyterian church sold the parsonage to Ephraim King Wilson (1821-1891), one of the most prominent attorney's and statesmen living in Worcester County at the time. At the settlement of Wilson's estate after his death in 1891, his town property, "...which was the residence property of the late Judge Ephraim K. Wilson up to the time of his death" was sold to Leroy Smith for \$1855. Leroy Smith resided in the large house until the mid twentieth century. After Smith's death in 1953, his widow, Helen, held title to the property until 1961.

The Ephraim King Wilson house is located at 304 West Federal Street in the western residential section of Snow Hill, Worcester County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story cross-shaped frame house, now divided into apartments, faces southeast with the principal gable roof oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

Built around 1860, this large two-and-a-half story cross-shaped house is supported by a low common bond brick foundation, and the house is sheathed with a layer of asbestos shingles. Covering the steeply pitched roof is a layer of asphalt shingles.

The southeast elevation is a basically symmetrical facade dominated by a projecting two-story bay pavilion flanked by three-bay wings to each side. The corner of the pavilion, as well as the corners of the house in general, are trimmed with plain pilasters. Highlighting the two-story bay are bracketed eaves, and paneled knee walls trim the wall below the two-over-two sash windows. The gable front above the two-story bay is pierced by a round arched window covered by arched louvered shutters. Marking the east and west sides of the pavilion roof are gabled dormers filled with arched two-over-two sash windows. Piercing the center of the house roof is an interior brick stack topped by a corbelled cap.

The three-bay wings to each side of the center block are defined by side entrances and flanking two-over-two sash windows hung with louvered shutters. The front doors on each side are framed by two-light sidelights and single-pane transoms. Sheltering the first floor on each side is a chamfered post porch trimmed with decorative brackets. The second floor of each side is lighted by two-over-two sash windows, some of which retain louvered shutters. Centered on the roof of each wing is a cross gable pierced with a round arched two-over-two sash window.

The gable ends of each wing are simply treated with two-over-two sash windows lighting each floor, and an interior end brick stack protrudes through the roof.

Attached to the back of the house are a pair of two-story one-room plan wings flanking the rear extension of the center block.

The interior was not seen.






