The Purnell-Shockley house is a large early twentieth century ell-shaped frame dwelling that marks the southwest corner of North Church and West Market streets in the center of Snow Hill. This prominent dwelling, supported by a rusticated concrete block foundation and finished with subtle neo-classical details, was built evidently around 1905, after Levi A. Purnell's death in August of 1903. The Sanborn Insurance Company map of Snow Hill printed in 1895 indicates a smaller dwelling on the site. The extant house occupies a prominent corner in the heart of Snow Hill, and although the dwelling is not one of the oldest in town, it contributes to the overall historic character of the Market and Church streets.

This corner lot has been improved by a private residence since the mid nineteenth century, however during the eighteenth century the property was known as the Market Square as designated on Joshua Mitchell's 1793 survey of the town. However, by the turn of the eighteenth century the area across from the courthouse along Market, Washington, Spence's Alley (now Green Street) and Cutler's Alley (now Pearl Street) had developed into the principal business section of Snow Hill. It is not certain what improvements, if any, were located on the old Market Square during the ownership of Robert Dennis and his grandson, John G. W. Waters which lasted until 1825. In fact the property seems to have been unimproved throughout the first half of the nineteenth century. The record of an improvements on the site is found in an 1865 deed between Samuel H. Jarman and Littleton R. Purnell, and L. R. Purnell is designated at this site on the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas of 1877.

The property was sold to Levi A. Purnell in April 1880 for \$2,200, . a sum that reflects a substantial house. Levi A. Purnell died in August 1903, and it is estimated that the extant dwelling was erected during the ownership of Levi Purnell's heir, Mary E. Purnell and her husband Thomas M. Purnell. Purnell family ownership of the house did not end until the early 1940s. In December 1941 Walter J. Shockley and his wife Addie acquired the house and corner lot. After Walter's death, Addie maintained title to the house until 1978 when the current owners bought the property.

The Purnell-Shockley house is located at 112 North Church Street at the intersection of Church and Federal streets in the center of Snow Hill, Worcester County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, three-bay frame house faces northeast with the principal gable roof oriented on a northwest/southeast axis.

Built around 1905, this two-and-a-half story, three-bay frame dwelling is supported on a raised rusticated concrete block foundation, and the house is uniformly sheathed with narrow weatherboard siding. The steeply pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-and-a-half story service wing.

The northeast (main) elevation is an asymmetrical elevation with a center double-door entrance framed by single-pane sidelights. A tripartite window flanks the entrance on the south and a window with leaded glass panes defines the north bay. Sheltering the first floor is a square columned porch supported on rusticated concrete piers. The second floor is highlighted by a slightly projected center bay filled with a tripartite window of single-pane sash. Piercing the gable end pediment above is a small Venetian-type window. Large size single-pane sash windows flank the projecting bay.

The north gable end is a symmetrical elevation with pairs of single-pane sash windows lighting each floor. The gable end above the second floor is framed into a pediment with a paired, round arched attic windows surrounded by a field of fish-scale shingles. The windows on each floor flank an interior end brick stack that is finished with a corbelled and dentiled cap. Piercing the roof of the south central end is another brick stack.

The two-and-a-half story, two-bay service wing is distinguished by a single-story bay window as well as an oriole window on the north side. In addition a screened porch fits under the oriole window to shelter the side entrance. Fixed above the oriole window is a gable front roof pierced by a lunette window with radiating muntins. Rising through the center of the service wing is a third brick stack.

The south side of the house is detailed in a plainer fashion with basically the same finishes. Attached to the southwest end of the service wing is an enclosed two-story section covered by a low pitched roof.

The interior was not seen.

A contemporary single-story garage stands behind the house.




