In the 1970s, previous surveyors gave this house an MIHP number and wrote a brief one-page form for the building.

NRHP Eligibility: Not Recommended

Criterion A: The Maryland Department of Taxation and Assessments real property database records the construction date of the house as 1800, and in Paul Touart's book "Along the Seaboard Side: The Architectural History of Worcester County, Maryland," published in 1992 the construction date of the house is estimated as 1840. The building is associated with the early history of Worcester County, but there are thirty-three other houses from the 1800-1860 era located in Worcester County towns. The building is recommended not eligible under Criterion A.

Criterion B: Criterion B: The building is not associated with persons important in history, and is recommended as not eligible under Criterion B.

Criterion C: The Conner-Collins House has been heavily altered with vinyl siding, trim, and windows, new metal doors,

replacement of the front porch, and enclosure of a side porch with vinyl windows and a steel door. No pre-1980 materials are visible on the exterior today, except for the brick chimney. The house is recommended not eligible under Criterion C.

Criterion D: The building appears to have no potential to reveal any significant historical information and is recommended as not eligible under Criterion D.




