NOTABLE FEATURES, HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE AND DESCRIPTION</p> <p style="text-align: right;">OPEN TO PUBLIC NO</p> <p>The Peters Farm House was originally a three-bay-long, two-story, brick building with chimney on the north gable. Around 1930, the house was made five bays long with an 'L' off the new two bays and the hall was also elongated. Then the entire structure was covered with stucco and a large two-story porch added on its east facade with massive Doric columns.</p> <p>The entrance is now located in the center of the building and it has a seven-pane transom and a very wide door. The old windows have twelve over twelve sash on the first story and twelve over eight on the second story, except those on the north gable which have nine over nine and nine over six. The porch covers up the front cornice, but the rear is worthy of note. It has shaped modillions, dentils and inverted scallops (see the Ewell House, Ironshire). The cornice was copied perfectly when the wing was added. On the stair addition is a palladian style window said to have been above the front door prior to the additions.</p> <p>Within, the original woodwork remains in the north room. It has two-part chair rail with pilasters beneath the trim around the windows and a mantel with the inverted scallops (like the exterior cornice) and some reeding set in small triangles along the base of the mantel. It also has pilasters extending to the floor. The window jambs have recessed panels and the original sash, though much of the glass has been broken by storms in recent years.</p> <p>The house stands on a swell of ground on a neat large farm overlooking Chincoteage Bay.</p> <p>5.
