CONTRIBUTING RESOURCE COUNT: 1

The Morris-Holland-Gault Cemetery is a small family burial plot located on the west side of US 113, approximately 1,500 feet west of the highway and some 1,125 feet south of Carey Road. The cemetery contains nine burials that are identified by above ground by markers, with two burials situated within an enclosure. The burials date from 1847 to an unknown date in the twentieth century.

The burials are oriented east-west—a standard practice in Protestant cemeteries—with the faces of the headstone markers facing east. The burials are arranged in three rows, with the two burials within the enclosure and two others to the north making up the westernmost row. Four burials make up the center row, while a single burial comprises the easternmost row. Except for one burial in the enclosure, all of the burials are noted by one-piece headstones and footstones of marble that follow a traditional rounded shape for headstones and a block shape for footstones. The exception is an elaborate monument constructed of four pieces of marble or perhaps granite. In all, there are eight headstones and nine footstones, as two of the burials share the same headstone. All of the markers feature incised epitaphs.

The enclosure is in poor to fair condition. It is constructed of four courses of concrete block with a concrete cap and four corner blocks. The face of each block has a manufactured appearance that resembles random ashlar masonry. Fragments of a former cast iron fence are located at the base of the enclosure's east side. The enclosure measures approximately 31'-6" wide by 13'-9" deep. The entire cemetery appears to measure some 55'-6" wide by 39'-5" deep.

Alterations to the cemetery include the loss of the cast iron fence and minor damage and deterioration at the enclosure and several of the markers.

The Morris-Holland-Gault Cemetery survives as an example of the common rural practice in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries of burying family members on the family property in an area away from the dwelling and work areas. The cemetery is located at the end of a line of trees that extends out into agricultural fields and is more than 1,000 feet from the nearest historic dwelling. The cemetery has been given its name based on the family names inscribed on the existing markers. The order of the names has been based on the death dates noted on the markers, with the earliest date, 1847, belonging to Thomas Morris, a date of 1857 belonging to Edward Holland, and a date of 1864 belonging to William Gault. Other members of these families as well as two members of the Brittingham family are buried in the cemetery, but these dates tend to be later in the nineteenth century or in the twentieth century. The relationship of the families to one another is not known. It is assumed that they were related by marriage.

The ownership of the cemetery is unclear from deed and tax records. The cemetery appears to lie within the current legal tax parcel owned by Richard J., Jr., and Ellen M. Truitt. However, a 1915 deed reference associated with the Rachel A. Gault House (WO-513), which is located approximately 1,375 feet southeast of the cemetery, describes an easement through the property for the purpose of providing access to a graveyard (WCCC Deed Book ODC 19:114). In addition, Rachel's sister and father are buried in the cemetery. The Gault House predates the Truitt House (WO-474) by 30-50 years, so it is likely that the cemetery was once on Gault property. If a transfer of the cemetery was made at some time in the past, it is not clear from the existing records.

Thomas D. Morris died as an infant at age one. Edward H. Holland died at age 28. Census records note that he was a farmer (U.S. Bureau of the Census 1850). William Gault died at age 66 and was a farmer of some




means. He had a real estate worth of \$5,000.00 and a personal estate worth \$1,000.00 in 1860 (U.S. Bureau of the Census 1860). He was married and had four children, and a fifteen-year-old African-American "laborer" was part of the household.

Also buried in the cemetery are Joshua and Rachel I. Morris, the parents of Thomas. Joshua died in 1857 at age 60; Rachel died in 1881 at age 74. Another member of the Morris family, Robert J. M. Morris, died sometime in the early twentieth century. His marker is badly weathered and cannot be read clearly. Sarah C. Gault, sister of Rachel and daughter of William, died sometime in the early twentieth century. Her marker is also badly weathered and is difficult to read. Census records indicate that she kept house in the years after her father's death; her sister, Rachel, was the head of the household and worked as a farmer (U.S. Bureau of the Census 1880). The most recent burials in the cemetery appear to belong to James and Gertrude Brittingham. Their shared headstone contains no date or age information, but by the condition of the marker and the type of font used to inscribe the names, theirs would appear to be later twentieth century burials.

Using the Maryland Comprehensive Historic Preservation Plan Data, this would place the Morris-Holland-Gault Cemetery in the following periods: Agricultural/Industrial Transition (A.D. 1815-1870); Industrial/Urban Dominance (A.D. 1870-1930); and possibly the Modern Period (A.D. 1930-Present). The current legal tax parcel containing the cemetery encompasses 9.45 acres; the cemetery itself appears to encompass only .05 acres.

The Morris-Holland-Gault Cemetery is recommended ineligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places in accordance with the criteria of eligibility in 36 CFR 60.4. Cemeteries are not ordinarily considered eligible for the National Register, and this cemetery does not appear to satisfy the exceptions noted under Criteria Consideration D: it contains no graves of significant persons; it is not of significant age; it displays no significant design features; and it is not associated with significant historic events.








