NOTABLE FEATURES, HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE AND DESCRIPTION <span style="float: right;">OPEN TO PUBLIC</span>  <p style="text-align: center;">This house is typical of the three-bay, frame, Federal houses with gable being the main facade. The facade has a central entrance with double doors, reeded pilaster and pediment with fanlight. A window flanks the entrance on each side. The three windows of the second floor are the same size as those of the first floor, having nine over six sash and black louvered shutters. Within the gable are two quarter-round windows concealed by louvered shutters. The cornice has shallow modillion blocks.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">It is also three bays deep, the bay nearest the facade on both sides being a door, the one on the east with transom. The doors have flush beaded panels.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">To the east are two wings; a two-story, one-bay wing and a two-bay, one-story wing, forming a telescope. There are small [outshuts?] on several sides of the wings.</p>
