Sash are nine over six. The studs extend past the joists forming "knee-room." It has a less steep pitch roof than the kitchen. There is a chimney on its east side. It is connected to the kitchen by a small, two-bay hyphen. The kitchen appears to be the oldest portion of the house with its nine over six sash, curved end-boards and enclosed leanto on south side. There are two small chimneys on the kitchen east gable, one within, the other without the frame of the building.</p>
