PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY

Cheverly Historic District

Criteria Considered: A &C

Following discussion, Richard Longstreth moved to table the nomination and Jean Russo seconded the motion, all in favor. Committee members recommended that the nomination be revised to include a fuller discussion of how African American homebuyers were able to defy racial covenants. Committee also asked that period of significance be revised to exclude Mount Hope, or discuss more fully the fact that as a c. 1839 plantation, the labor force would have been largely if not exclusively enslaved.
